* Tuesday July 15, Darryn Petersen will give an illustrated talk about restoration of old houses.

Darryn Petersen is our local expert in the restoration of old houses, including the Chapman Hall house and the Alna Meeting House. His talk may interest Summer visitors as well as local residents.

* Tuesday August 12, David Buczkowski, "The Sheepscot Valley Narrow Gauge, A Brief History, Current Affairs, and a Vision for Tomorrow"

David Buczkowsk is the president of the Wiscasset, Waterville and Farmington (WW&F) Railway. This is a two-foot "narrow" gauge railroad which served Maine's Sheepscot Valley for 40 years until closing in the Great Depression. The highly skilled volunteers of WW&F have faithfully restored it to working life. It is a favorite family weekend destination for local residents and visitors.

* Tuesday Oct 21, Tim Dinsmore will give an illustrated talk about the original families who settled here.

Tim Dinsmore is the president of the Newcastle Historical Society. He is the unique archeologist who studies local history.
