A Facelift for the Historical Center

The clapboards on the old 1818 schoolhouse are showing their age, with badly peeling paint. The Town, which owns the building (on lease to the Society), is considering restoration plans. Bill Horton represents the Society in this planning. At its annual meeting, the Society approved giving \$1000 toward the cost of the restoration. The Student Council at the Nobleboro Central School organized an outdoor festival in June that raised \$547.85 for the restoration. A donation of \$1000 was also received from Gloria and John Markewich of Nashua, N.H. (life members of the Society).

Historic Artifacts

Our acquisition book lists the rather amazing total of 897 items contributed to the Society since 1975. Some of the outstanding contributions are on display at the Historical Center. Others are stored on basement shelves or in the fireproof vault.
