Historical Center Care – thank you to Nobleboro!

The foundation for the Historical Center has been sealed correctly, proper drains and gravel fill were used, and there will be a gutter on the north side of the Center – all of this was done to stop the continuous flooding of the basement floor and the significant damage to our artifacts from the moisture. The basement seems to be just fine now! We are grateful to the Town for paying 75% of the cost – and to Deb Wilson and Dale Wright for all the hours they spent being sure the job was done right!

Now the Building Committee (Al O'Donnell, Bill Horton, Roger Hathaway, Henry Simmons) can begin to deal with sealing the basement walls and making the area more functional – so the artifacts will be safe and more accessible.

Three Scholarship Awards

Again this year the Society gave three \$1,000 scholarships – two from the Society and the third from the Eleanor Purney Scholarship, donated by the Galpin and McFadden families.

Oral History Project with School—Again & Again!

The Oral History Project 'Growing up in Nobleboro' done with the Nobleboro Central School 8th grade history class was so successful in 2007 that it was repeated in 2008 with the 6th and 7th graders, who interviewed WW II veterans – including Bill Horton, Bob Howarth, Fred Peck, and Norm VanDine.

This school year we will gather more oral history with local WW II veterans and those who 'served' at home – with the goal of making a documentary from the interviews. Carolyn Hardman, Society volunteer and former history teacher, and I will work with Daryl Hahn, social studies teacher, and Mark Deblois, principal. Once again the Society will support Jo Radner, an experienced oral history person, to teach the students how to do oral histories. All WW II volunteers welcome!

Nobleboro Cemeteries

Work continues on the 84 cemeteries in town; 15 large dead trees were removed from Blackstone-Flagg cemetery; the Spear family volunteered to remove a large oak in another cemetery. Restoration of Chimney Farm writer's cottage

Volunteers are restoring the writer's shack at Chimney Farm (East Neck Road) used by Henry Beston and Elizabeth Coatsworth. Jim Derby, a professional house/ barn restorer, and volunteers from Damariscotta Lake Watershed Association and the Historical Society are contributing many hours. Kate Barnes, Beston's daughter, contributed \$1,000 for materials.

Among other projects, Barbara typed the entire manuscript of Nobleboro, Maine—A History on her handy Tandy computer; the Tandy will be given to the Society.
