"The Maine Homefront in World War I" 7:00 P.M. for talk only

Earle Shettleworth, Maine State Historian, State Historic Preservation Officer, and Director of the Maine Historic Preservation Commission returns to speak at our Annual Dinner.

Ninety- nine years ago this spring, on April 6, 1917, America entered World War I. With the same patriotic fervor that Maine had responded to a call for troops in the Civil War, more than 32,000 men and women across the state joined the military in 1917-18 to fight in a "war to end all wars" that promised to "make the world safe for democracy.

This illustrated lecture documents the role played by Maine men and women in World War I, especially here at home. Previously unseen historic photographs, many of them real photo post cards of the period, tell the story of recruitment, departures, parades, bond drives, shipbuilding, war-related industries, and knitting socks for the soldiers. This chapter in Maine's past comes alive in

these century old pictures.

"Tide Mills In Midcoast Maine" 7:00 PM

Local maritime historian Bud Warren will tell the story of Maine's early tidal mills. Bud is also known as *The Tide Mill Man*. He researched and lectured extensively on maritime topics and has also been active in several archaeological excavations of Maine's coastal sites. Early settler dammed coves and set up water wheels to harness the power of the tides and over 150 Maine tide mills have been identified.

Bud has personally located many of these mills. He is co-founder of Tide Mill Institute, an organization dedicated to preserving the heritage of America's tide mills, and has documented over 200 of them on the Maine coast from Kittery to Lubec.


